Activities took place during breaks and lunchtime in the school hall, and were open to all staff and students. All year groups also donated to Children in Need by paying to take part in a non-uniform day, with some choosing to wear fancy dress!

Mrs Robinson, organiser of the event, said, "Pre-Covid, we have always had a non-uniform day and various other activities in the past - this is the first time we have properly celebrated and supported for a while though. Nothing has cost more than 50p, as we know money is tight, but we were working on the premise that if everyone gives a little, we can gain a lot."

Headteacher Mrs Gibbins added, "I am so proud of how much our students got involved in the activities, and the huge donations they made, especially in these times of hardship for so many in our community."


I was lucky enough to go on the Year 7 Norfolk Lakes Trip towards the end of November for three days. I really enjoyed it!



A Christmas Carol by Charles Dickens is the best known and most loved of all Christmas novels. With its tale of Scrooge's seasonal redemption through Christmas past, present and future, it is the ultimate feel-good, heartwarming parable. This Victorian literature combines a simple narrative style with Gothic horror - the darker side of human nature mixed with the supernatural. It is also a GCSE text that students begin to study in Year 10, ready for their Year 11 exams. The themes and characters, along with the context of the book, will be analysed until the students know the book inside out!

The Victorians loved the festive season and introduced a lot of the traditions we know and partake in today, including giving Christmas cards and gifts, pulling crackers and decorating Christmas trees. Victorian England along with Charles Dickens' ghostly Christmas Carol, freshly cut holly, Christmas markets vibrant with the sound of carol singers, figgy pudding and sugarplums are so reminiscent of an old-fashioned Christmas that it brings feelings of warmth, comfort and tradition. Design Technology



Our KS3 students had the opportunity to take part in the DT mini-makes club which is held half-termly. The first club was focused on making beautiful poppies for Remembrance Day.

First, the students created a drawing of a poppy using computer software, then they sent it to the laser cutter. This cuts the design from acrylic. They then shaped their designs using thermo- forming equipment. Finally, the poppies were assembled using wire to hold the buttons to their flower shapes and the wires were covered with a shrink wrap sleeve. Ms Wright even came along and made a poppy!

The Year 11 Prize Presentation and GCSE Certificate Evening took place at Smithdon on Tuesday 22 November. This was the first school prize presentation for three years!

Around 200 people were present, including students from the Class of 2022, their parents, staff, school governors, representatives from Hunstanton Town Council, the Hunstanton Heritage Centre and members of Hunstanton and District Rotary Club.

All students received their GCSE exam board certificates, which were presented by the Hunstanton Mayor, Councillor Maureen Howard. Twenty subject awards were introduced by Assistant Headteacher, Mr Chapman and were presented by our Headteacher, Mrs Gibbins. These awards were based on nominations from subject staff.

Each award winner received a glass trophy, which included a plaque with details of their award. Chair of Governors, Mr Crofts, presented the awards for the two students with the highest GCSE progress scores and the two students with the greatest GCSE achievement scores.















A number of special awards were also presented, including the Clare Shield for English Language, the Connie Martin Award for English Literature, the Hall Exhibition Foundation Endowed Prize for Mathematics, the Hunstanton Round Table Award for Physical Education, the NHS Shield for Health and Social Care and the Clare Shield for Art.

Awards recognising further achievements included the George Raines Memorial Award for Sport, the Hunstanton Lions Prize for Service to the School and its Community and the Pastoral Leader Award. Two awards were presented by Mr Greyson, the current President of Hunstanton and District Rotary Club. These were the Rotary Award for School Values and the the Rotary Young Citizen Award.

Before the industrial revolution, the typical English moth was light-coloured. This meant that it was difficult for birds and other predators to see them against light-coloured trees or clean walls. Once industry had spread across northern England, the coal that was burnt covered the countryside with black soot. A new dark form of moth emerged.

This black moth appeared suddenly and soon took over the population of moths in industrial areas. But then the population declined just as quickly as it had grown, following the the closure of coal mines.

Pollution levels dropped, clean air laws were introduced, and the sootiness that prevailed during the 19^{th} Century disappeared from the cities.

And so, just as quickly as the black moths emerged, the

lighter ones made their dramatic return along with the cleaner conditions. Biologists have predicted that the dark moths will soon be extinct.

The Year 7, Black Cloud' moth installation in the Art Department pays homage to those beautiful dark creatures that were born alongside England's industrious machines. Out of the darkness and dirt, came beauty.

Carlos Amorales, a Mexican artist, created such moth installations, which he called Black Cloud. He used thousands of black paper moths affixed to the walls of large interior spaces in Spain.

As you can see, the Black Cloud installation is dramatic and beautiful. Maybe if you were to walk down the corridors and listen closely, you could hear the faint whispering of fluttering wings.






If a Christmas Concert wasn't enough this term, we also put on our school Production of Oliver Jr!

students and returning students to our


practical extravaganza!

Members of the YAB are called Young Commissioners.


