SMITHDON IN THE NEWS

Record results obtained by Smithdon GCSE students!



Students at Smithdon High School have been celebrating after receiving record GCSE results this year. The school received its best-ever exam results, with the Class of 2023 achieving grades almost 10% above the 2019 results.

Despite national warnings of lower gradings, 67% of Smithdon students achieved a standard pass of Grade 4 and above in English and Maths, while 38% attained a strong pass of Grade 5 and above in those subjects. Other subjects with improved outcomes included History, Art, and Music.

Smithdon's Head teacher Mrs Gibbins said, "Smithdon students' results are representative of the progress that the school continues to make. I am so pleased for all of our Year 11s. These results represent what students can achieve when they work hard. I am proud not only of their success but also of the efforts of our school staff who have provided high-quality teaching and pastoral care to support them in their achievements."

Mr Chapman, Smithdon's Assistant Head teacher, added, "Congratulations to all our Year 11 students who worked so hard for these fantastic results. I wish them all the best as they go on to the next stage of their education. We have all been celebrating after receiving record GCSE results this year."

The students worked very hard for these results by attending the revision sessions and also by being self-motivated to study and revise. We wish all of them the very best for their futures and we hope they left Smithdon with some great memories.

Smithdon student performs at the Rock for Heroes show!

OPEN EVENING

On 26 September, we welcomed prospective students and their families to Smithdon's Open Evening. We followed the usual format of having a presentation in the hall followed by student-led tours with Year 7 and 11 students leading groups around the school grounds.

All departments had rooms open to view and offered activities for the children to participate in:

The Hospitality and Catering Department had "guess the spices" and "spot the hazards" - important tasks in the cooking rooms!

The MFL Department challenged the visitors to build the Eiffel Tower with pasta spaghetti and marshmallows! For those that were not confident in their edible-construction skills, there were puzzles available that tested their knowledge on the French words for colours and numbers.

The English Department used the Year 7 set book, *Sir Gawain and the Green Knight*, to give Year 6 pupils a taster of what they will be studying in their English lessons. They had to describe the *Green Knight* with adjectives - without the obvious "green" or "tall".

A tent and camping gear was also on display to showcase the Duke of Edinburgh Award we offer. We now have many students taking part, from Bronze to Gold, with the Year 9 students currently deciding on their *Skills*, *Volunteering* and *Physical* activities.

The feedback from the evening was very good, and our students who helped - after a busy school-day - were good examples of The Smithdon Seven, the values we we all work by.

We thoroughly enjoyed meeting the Year 6 pupils and hope to see them next September in Smithdon uniform.

We also hosted a co-curricular evening for our current students and their families to come along to see which clubs we offer. There are a number of clubs operating across the school in order to help students enjoy and achieve, these include Homework Club, Dungeons and Dragons, Chess Club, a variety of Sports Clubs and subject-specific clubs. 
What we have discovered as the years go by, is that within the Gen Z population, 'reading for pleasure' has somewhat been replaced by social media and 'gaming for pleasure'. Books have been replaced by gaming controllers and smart phones. There was a time not along ago when we might have seen that as a cause for worry, sadness and disappointment. Now, we try to think of it as an opportunity. Instead of us promoting books as the antidote to gaming, we are now pitching them to our students as friendly companions to their much-loved hobby. It is easy to see all art forms as derivative of each other, or on opposing ends of a spectrum of cultural worthiness,

when maybe we should see them as complementary. Technology will keep evolving, our habits will keep changing. But we are hoping that Gen Z, Alpha and all the future generations after them, will still see the humble book as something relevant and important, instead of antique or outdated.

The Epic of Gilgamesh, reportedly the first ever book, is a series of tales, full of adventure, friendship, death and tragedy. The epic is regarded as a foundation work for religion and the tradition of heroic sagas, with Gilgamesh, the protagonist, forming the prototype for later heroes like Hercules. The writers of these stories would never have thought that the ancient clay tablets they wrote upon, thousands of years later, would evolve into a different type of tablet. That their stories would be inspirational to future story-tellers, including game designers!

This summer's annual literacy survey report by the National Literacy Trust concluded that 73% of young people who don't enjoy reading do, in fact, love video games - because it immerses them in a story. Games are being turned into TV series - you may have seen The Witcher and The Last of Us. So is gaming just another way of story-telling but with the players in control? It certainly is another way to exercise our brains, relax or escape from reality for a while. Albeit with visuals and shouting at the screens!

Our Creative Writing Group is up and running again!


Whether you want to work on your story-writing technique, or learn about different styles of writing, or even enter your writing into various competitions, the Creative Writing Club has something to suit everyone.

Madagascar

His donation will help to safeguard threatened tropical rain-forest in Madagascar, which is home to many species including rare species of lemur.

Smithdon High School Geography Department was delighted to receive the certificate and the accompanying information. Students in Year 10 study the rainforest in Madagascar as part of their GCSE Geography course.



Geography Field Trip



All Year 10 Geographers took part in our annual Norwich field trip day on Wednesday 11 October. Students were accompanied by myself, Ms Bazeley-Smith, Mr Duncan and Mrs King.

On arrival in Norwich, we carried out a range of urban fieldwork techniques including: traffic counts, pedestrian counts, questionnaires, land use surveys and environmental quality surveys.

Mr Duncan's group also enjoyed the open top bus tour of Norwich operated by City Sightseeing. The 45-minute tour took them all over Norwich with views of the castle, cathedral, the river Wensum, the railway station and Norwich City Football Club. The highlight of the trip was a journey up Mousehold Heath to experience an amazing view across the city. A delayed bus meant that Mr Chapman's group was unable to take the tour. Instead, they walked around the mound of Norwich Castle to see a number of prominent Norwich sights including the Forum, cathedral and the football ground.

There was also time for lunch and a bit of shopping!

CHESS

On 29 September, the Smithdon chess team excitedly visited Marshland High School to take part in the Trust Chess Tournament. The atmosphere was tense and the hall was silent as they battled Springwood, St Clements and Marshland for the top position. Some games lasted just three moves, whilst some outlasted all the others, with all 40 players crowded around the table, eager to see how it was going to end: stalemate, resignation or checkmate?

All of the students made our school proud by behaving incredibly and representing the school with maturity and good sportsmanship.


The Drama Department has been taking students off site, including taking a group to see The Paper
